If you had refused God's love...

Ephesians 2:1-3 As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature objects of wrath.

Repentance

Objective:	This lesson will show the student the difference between true and false repentance and how to experience true repentance.
Introduction:	Repentance is essential to constructing a firm foundation in Christ. There is a great difference between true repentance and worldly sorrow, and unfortunately, too many have confused the two. The work of repentance originates from God through the convicting work of the Holy Spirit, but you have a vital role to play in the process, too. A clear understanding of sin and repentance will lay a strong foundation in your life, and upon it you can build the other vital principles of your faith.

Summary:

Because of the Fall, sin is part of human life. Sin displeases God and separates us from Him. To be forgiven of sin, we must first repent of it. Repentance means much more than feeling sorry for sin. It includes confession of wrongdoing, willingness to give up the sin, conscious turning from it, and acceptance of Jesus' sacrificial death as atonement. True repentance brings pardon, forgiveness, and restoration. All heaven is made glad when even one sinner repents!

The New Birth

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
Key Verse:	"Jesus answered and said to him, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again he cannot see the kingdom of God'" (John 3:3 NASB).
Key Scriptures:	John 3:16–17 Romans 3:21–28; 10:9–13 Luke 13:23–25
Objective:	This lesson will provide the student with a solid understanding as to what the new birth is and how to share the new birth with others.
Introduction:	The first of the fundamental teachings that Paul lists in Hebrews 6:1–2 is by far the most elementary. It is where Christianity begins, and it deals with the truths surrounding the new birth (John 3:1–7). Probably no phrase more inclusively summarizes the definition of the new birth than the phrase restoration of spiritual life. In order to be saved and follow the Lord Jesus as His disciples, we must first believe that we are sinners and that Jesus died for our sins. We must repent and ask God to forgive us. Then we must yield our lives to Jesus and make Him our Lord and Savior (Mark 1:15; Acts 20:21; John 1:12).

I. What is saving faith?


- Saving faith is faith that leads to salvation. It implies the following aspects:
 - 1. Committing your life to God (Ps. 37:5).
 - 2. Believing in Jesus (John 3:16).
 - 3. Obeying from the heart (Rom. 6:17).
 - 4. Believing with the heart (Rom. 10:9–10).
 - 5. Believing the Bible to be the Word of God (2 Tim. 3:16–17).
 - 6. Putting your trust in God (Heb. 2:13).
 - 7. Inviting Jesus into your life (Rev. 3:20).

• Saving faith means receiving Jesus as Savior, by faith. It is experienced through the following steps:


1. All people must realize they are separated from God because of sin (Isa. 59:2; Rom. 3:9, 10, 23; Gal. 3:22; Eph. 2:1–3; Col. 1:21; 1 Tim. 2:4; 4:10).




2. They must realize that all their religious, self-righteous, scientific, and philosophical efforts to reach God are futile (Isa. 64:6; Col. 2:6–8).



3. They must realize that Jesus Christ is God's *only* provision for their sin (John 14:6; 1 Tim. 2:4–5; Acts 4:12; 13:38–39; 2 Cor. 5:19).



4. They must individually receive forgiveness for their sins through Jesus by *faith* (John 1:12–13; 3:1–8, 15–18, 36; Rom. 3:19–28; Gal. 2:16; 1 John 5:11–13



II. What does it means to be born again?

- 2 Corinthians 5:17 Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new.
- 1 Thessalonians 5:23 Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you completely; and may your whole spirit, soul, and body be preserved blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
- To be born again means to receive life in the deepest part of your being, that is, your spirit (2 Cor. 5:17).
- Jesus says that you cannot see the kingdom of God until you are born again.

III. What are the results of the new birth?

• The new birth *legally* restores to you all that was lost at the Fall.

(Titus 3:5; John 1:12-13; Eph. 1:3)

- You receive God's righteousness: (2 Cor. 5:17, 21; Rom. 5:19).
- You receive God's life
- You are restored to God's _____
- You receive God's rule and authority: Sin caused humanity to forfeit God's rule within and to relinquish authority upon the earth to establish God's kingdom, but the new birth restores God's original plan. The new birth does this by giving believers' legal authority and power over both sin and Satan.
- You receive God's blessing.

	The new birth is as real and momentous as is physical birth. At the time of the new birth, a person is spiritually reborn. He becomes a part of a very real family, the body of Christ. It is the starting point from which we all begin our Christian journey.
Summary:	The new birth is experienced by a person's confessing of sin, acknowledging his need for a savior, realizing that Jesus is God's provision for sin, and then willfully surrendering his life to Jesus. In that moment, he is born again, and all the rights lost at the Fall are now legally restored to him. Righteousness, eternal life, fellowship,

authority, and blessing are now his as a child of God.

Understanding the Victory of the Cross

Key Verse:	"I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself up for me" (Gal. 2:20 NASB)

Objective:	The goal of this lesson is to teach you why you need the cross and what the cross has won for you.
Introduction:	The Christian faith rests totally upon what Jesus Christ accomplished on the cross for all humanity. Without the victory won on the cross, the Christian would be totally helpless and powerless. Satan does not want you to comprehend the awesome victory of the cross. He wants you to live in unbelief and despair, ignorant of the Father's great love for you and desire to meet your needs. God has established His promises and principles in the cross of Calvary. If God failed to sustain His people and meet them at every point of spiritual, physical and material need, He would be denying the work He has already accomplished through His Son Jesus (2 Cor. 8:9). When you understand why you need the cross and when you are aware of the areas in which Christ triumphed on your behalf, you can begin the wonderful process of walking in victory in your daily Christian journey.

- I. There are five main reasons why you need the cross.
 - You need the cross to free you from guilt and (Ex. 34:7; Rom. 3:19).
 - 1. He bore our sins in His body on the cross.

- You need the cross to deliver you from the oppression of the Devil (Eph. 2:2; Heb. 2:14; Acts 10:38; Matt. 18:34).
- You need the cross to heal you from pain and suffering (Ps. 31:10).
- You need the cross to overcome anxiety and fear (Gen. 3:17-19; 1 John 4:18).
- You need the cross to defeat death (Rom. 6:23; Rev. 21:8).
- II. There are four victories in the cross of Christ.

 - 3. Absolute surrender to the Lord

IV. How to turn back the enemy's destruction

- Satan's major areas of destruction
- 1. Physical sickness
- 2. Bondage-especially to alcohol, drugs or sexual sins
