Principles of Prayer

Key Verse:	"It happened that while Jesus was praying in a certain place, after He had finished, one of His disciples said to Him, 'Lord, teach us to pray just as John also taught his disciples' " (Luke 11:1 NASB).

Objective:	This lesson will show the student the purpose, power, privilege, and responsibility of prayer.
Introduction:	Nothing is more important to building a strong foundation in Christ than is prayer. Through prayer, we cultivate our relationship with the Savior, find solace in the storms of life, receive power to be disciples, and learn to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd. No amount of Bible reading, Christian service, or church attendance—as valuable as those things are—can take the place of prayer in the life of the believer. Jesus was a man of prayer, and as His followers, we can be no less. As we follow His example in prayer, we become more like Him, and as we become more like Him, the foundation of our faith grows ever more solid.

I. Prayer is a top priority for a Christian.

• Jesus now intercedes for believers at the right hand of God. "(Rom. 8:34 Heb. 7:25 NIV).

II. What is prayer?

- Simply put, prayer is talking with God.
- Through prayer, you come to know God and thus build a relationship with Him.

• Prayer has many facets, including the following:

- 1. Waiting on the Lord (Isa. 40:31, Ps. 6:1–10; 27:14).
- 2. Interceding, or praying for others (Ezek. 22:30; 1 Tim. 2:1; Isa. 59:16).
- 3. Asking God for what you need (Matt. 7:7–11).
- 4. *Listening* to God (John 10:27).
- 5. *Standing* in spiritual warfare (Eph. 6:10–18).
- 6. Thanking God (1 Thess. 5:18; 1 Tim. 2:1).
- 7. Offering praise to God as a sacrifice (Heb. 13:15).

III. There are three foundations that build your confidence in prayer.

- Knowing God's character. Gen. 18:14; Jer. 32:17).
- Your position as a child of God
- The Holy Spirit within you

IV. Prayer has great power.

- The Holy Spirit is vital to effective, powerful prayer.
- Intercessory prayer is a special type of prayer that releases power on behalf of others.

V. There are some hindrances to effective prayer.

- Unforgiveness. Mark 11:22–25
- Unbelief, doubt, and lack of faith James 1:6-7

	actually change life situations and people through their fervent, upright
	prayers. He has chosen us to be co-laborers with Him, giving us the
	tremendous privilege of reconciling men, women, and children to the
	Father.

I. Scripture provides many examples of intercessors.

- **Abraham was an intercessor (Gen. 18:16–33).** Abraham made time for the Lord to speak to him (Gen. 18:1–3). By opening the door to the Lord and sitting down with Him, Abraham had the chance to hear the heart of God.
- Esther was another intercessor (Esther 4:10–16). "My maids and I will fast likewise. And so I will go to the king, which is against the law; and if I perish, I perish!" (Esther 4:16 NKJV).

•	Daniel was an intercessor (Dan. 9:1–27; 10:2–3). Daniel had been fasting and seeking God in deep intercession for twenty-one days because of Israel's enslavement and captivity in Babylon, following the destruction of Jerusalem and the temple.
